TBRA History

In December 1967 a group of technically oriented Amateurs was quite active on 146.94 simplex in the Tampa Area. Nine of this group met to form the nucleus of what later became known as the Tampa Bay Repeater Association; W4APV Jim Eberwine, K4RMU Jim Hinchee, WA4HAA Ken Kopp (KØPP), WB4COT Bob Hines WA4JYD Paul Bick, K4LMI Jack Howell, WA4UIB Ed Boardman, WA4RLG Jeff Harrow, and WB4IES Rick Jarman.

Based on the information they received about a VHF repeater in the Northeastern part of the United States, this group set to work constructing the 2nd licensed VHF repeater in the State of Florida From donated parts and the insides of a 1953 vintage Pre-progress Line unit, they built an 18 watt 2 meter repeater licensed in 1967 as WB4HAE. This repeater was single sited at the corner of Hillsborough Avenue and Dale Mabry with a 100 foot tower. Through a donation of 150 feet of 7/8 inch hardline by Harold Johnson W4ZCB it was possible to mount a receiver antenna at 80 feet and a tran smitter antenna at 40 feet.

The first elected officers of this new organization were; President Walt Terrie WA4FBI, Treasurer John Twigg WA4OUM, Corresponding Secretary Eddie Boardman WA4UIB, and Recording Secretary Jeff Harrow WA4RLG.

In January 1968 winds in excess of 60 miles per hour associated with a passing hurricane destroyed the tower and with it the hopes of a single site repeater.

With a budding membership of 10, new sites were selected and members set to work constructing a new repeater. WB4COT built the receiver, WA4HAA the transmitter, W4APV and K4LMI the IDer, WB4IES the control package and K4RMU the telephone interface.

WB4HAE returned to the air in mid 1968 with the transmitter atop the medical building, #1 Davis Island and the receiver in 12 story Delo Hall, University of Tampa. Many wee hours of the morning were spent by members in WB4HAA's garage to keep the repeater on the air.

The first issue of QSP came out in November 1970. Editor Walt Terrie WA4FBI explained his choice of QSP as the title of the club's newsletter as such: One of the international Q signals, "QSP" means essentially, "Please relay this message" with a little literary license, this signal can be reworded "PLEASE REPEAT". It lists the officers as President Ken Kopp WA4HAA,Vice President Stormy Bishop K4NOC, Treasurer Larry Estes WA4HDJ and Secretary Jim Olivenbaum K4MZR. 1970 has WA4HAA as President with 38 and WA4FBI serving as Trustee and the Tampa Bay Repeater Association became a reality and was chartered with the State of Florida as a non-profit organization. Also this year TBRA participated in it's first public service activity, a 25 mile hike for Development through Tampa of 14 hours duration. It was for participation in this activity the organization received its first plaque of appreciation.

In January 1972 Jim Hinchee K4RMU was elected President of TBRA and K4NPF Bob Guentner as Trustee, the 3rd person to become Trustee for 16/76. This administration greatly broadened the public service participation aspect of TBRA. A power amplifier was also added to the Tampa Repeater this year loaned by W4ZCB. WB4HAE came of the air in the summer of 1972 for a total rebuilding and TBRA was requested to remove their receiver from Delo Hall. A new receiver site was obtained atop the 15 story Bayshore Presbyterian Towers. Within six weeks a totally rebuilt two rach repeater was back on the air. This year QSP ran its first photo and WA4ZYU Richard Beatie assumed editorship of QSP.

In January 1973 WA4AGX Dick Shilson became President of TBRA with a membership of 100. It was the year autopatch was added to 146.16/76 repeater and TBRA weekly on-the-air-nets were initiated. QSP chores were assumed by Jim La Follette WB4WBL and K4RMU became the Trustee.

In 1974, Ray Kreigbaum WB4SIZ, after two years, secured permission to use the First Financial Towers for a repeater site. Ray also introduced the need for a repeater in Largo. Howard Matthews K4TIY became editor of QSP.

In January 1975 Jack Hartley K4WSB became the President of TBRA. During his administration the membership rolls more than doubled. The early part of this year the WB4HAE transmitter was moved from Davis Island to the Baptist Manor in order to provide better metropolitan coverage.

In January 1975 WB4HAE was re-licensed as WR4AAH and in early spring of the same year the receiver was moved from the Bayshore Presbyterian Towers to be single sited at the Baptist Manor utilizing a duplexer loaned to TBRA by members of the WTVT repeater organization. This single-siting was largely accomplished through the efforts of Bill Dudley WA4IBM and Ken Kaae WA6WOJ.

During the period 1975-1976 TBRA alternated its monthly meetings between Tampa and Clearwater.

During a meeting in early 1975 in Clearwater, a number of members made monetary contributions towards the establishment of a VHF repeater for use in Pinellas County. Upon this show of in-terest Larry Williams WB4YCQ and Fred Brunjes K4KIK constructed a Prog-line mobile telephone and with a loaned power supply from W4JVQ Cal Freidrich, WR4AKV went on the air on 146.37/97. Shortly thereafter, WA4IBM Bill and WB4YCQ Larry located a used G.E. Prog-line repeater, retuned it to 2 meters and purchased it for TBRA. The first location for WR4AKV was atop Mease Manor in Dunedin. It was later moved to the Southeast Bank Building in Largo. The first Trustee for this repeater was Mort Broad W4FR and Larry WB4YCQ took over as the second trustee in March 1975.

In 1976 with K4WSB still president TBRA had its First Annual Installation Banquet held at the First Financial Towers. Wally Provost K4KNW (now N4BZ) became editor of QSP. In May 1976 WA4IBM Bill Dudley became Trustee of the Largo 37/97 machine. WB4QVL Herb Shoun (KJ4H) Terri Provost K4KNX and N4BZ broadcast a ten week novice course on 16/76.

In January 1977 John Allen K8GHE became President of TBRA. He obtained a permanent meeting place at the Marine Corps Training Center. TBRA policies were written by N4BZ, WA4LQO, W4JVQ, WB4GDF and WB4FGQ. WA4CCX Al Geiger took over Trustee of WR4AAH 16/76. TBRA participated in the Gasparilla Festivities for the first time. Al Yorkunas W40PG designed TBRA logo, T-bra mascot and newsletter heading giving us a whole new look.

In 1978 Bob Shireling WB4GDF became President. The Tampa Repeater became the Official Hillsborough County Emergency repeater. K4KNX, W4HZY Helen de grandcourt and K8GHE's XYL Sandi published a TBRA Cookbook. TBRA bought a new duplexer and returned the borrowed one to the WTVT group. TBRA worked with the Hillsborough County Hospital Association in a disaster exercise involving a jumbo jet crash and tornado involving over 400 victims under TBRA's Emergency Director Mike Barnes WA7SKG. They also took on a portable repeater project with WA4KLW Bernie Glassen as Trustee on 146.19/79, WA4KLW/R Portable. Then with donations of over 50 TBRA members (known as Plank Owners) the East Bay Repeater WB4YRW/R on 147.705/105 became a reality with Mike McIntosh WB4YRW as Trustee. This year a Thursday Nite Nostalgia Net was instituted starring Frank Sgannon K4GT. FBRA also sponsored a "Santa Claus Net" with Shelly Shalett W9TDQ providing the jolly greetings.



The letters of TBRA don't spell much like anything in Webster unless of course, we insert a hyphen after the T. Now we've got a two sylable unmentionable for T-shirted YLs. Or to be a little more practical, a possible mascot the T-bra.

The Animal Atlas by E.L. Jordan ignores the T-bra, but look how aptly his closest cousin, the Z-bra suits us T-BRAS.

It gallops in herds. Is strong, alert, well fed, thoroughly at home in their environment. Extremely conspicuous or almost invisible, depending upon conditions. Head to body length <u>under</u> 7 feet and weight <u>under</u> 775 pounds. Specimens are remarkably similar but no two individuals are alike regarding bands. Both inquisitive and shy. Defends self vigorously. Stubbornly resists all attempts at domestication, but readily adapts to captivity. Has a tail like any respectable repeater.

Two meter FM has proven itself as a necessary adjunct to such events for crowd control, traffic, parking, and in particular for the safety of the partici-pants if the activity takes place on the public highway. Some of the events TBRA has been involved in are Horse Walks, walkathons, bikathons, bicycle races, telethons, parades, camporees and foot races. Special Public Service includes the Gasparilla Parade and Invasion, Special Olympics, Powder Puff Derby, Hillsborough County Hospital ass. disaster drill, ARRL Simulated Emergency Test, Schlitz-Lite Marathon, Clearwater Tornado, Innisbrook Major-League Allstar Softball Game and the Miss Tampa Pageant.
